It also inducted a certified mental health counselor Dr. Venika Krishna to help students and staff efficiently handle the stress of the pandemic. The College organized several webinars and online events to promote healthy living such as National Nutrition Week between 01.09.2020 to 05.09.2020, Fit India Movement on 25.09.2020, Pledge to fight against Covid on 08.10.2020, Where does Our Food Come From on 06.08.2020 and World Mental Health Day on 10.10.2020. <p>Infrastructure Development</p>	<p>The College has developed a New academic block covering app. 58000sq ft. which includes science labs, lecture theatres and seminar rooms. It has also unveiled its new state-of-the-art auditorium. The College is taking a big leap towards enhancing the learning experience of students with a dedicated research facility for its faculty and students in the form of a research centre that will come up shortly. The four storeyed building covering 38000 sq. feet. area will house laboratories for sciences, social sciences, linguistics and a media laboratory.</p>
<p>Following environment friendly and sustainable practices</p>	<p>Hindu College is fully committed to protecting the environment and finding ways to restore the ecological balance. The College is the first in the University to construct a Sewage Treatment Plant of 500,000 LD capacity which is now fully functional. The Department of Chemistry has adopted green practices by minimizing the quantity of chemicals required for different experiments by employing diluted solutions, using smaller burettes and pipettes and performing experiments in groups wherever feasible. Throughout the College LED lighting is used to save energy consumption. Hostels have Solar Water Heaters. Street lighting on campus is facilitated by Solar Power. The College judiciously</p>

uses paper for its official work and for academic activities. Waste paper generated by the College is collected by an NGO which utilizes it for recycling paper. The NGO makes notepads out of the recycled papers thereby saving trees and lowering the impact of paper as the third largest polluter

The College has Ankur Society and Equal Opportunity Cell to help the PwD students. The college holds remedial classes for helping those students who need more than the regular lectures and tutorials to accomplish their learning goals. The College has an active North-East Cell that organizes events to help raise awareness about the north-eastern part of the nation.

<p>Building a gender neutral and inclusive culture</p>	<p>At Hindu College gender equity and sensitization has always been upheld as a very high priority pursuit. The College has always believed in the practice of giving opportunities to women to hold positions of leadership in order to develop a gender equitable institution. Hindu College is proud of its Women Development Cell (WDC) which is committed to nurturing the strength of female students as well as towards creating a sensitized environment leading to gender equality. Human resource development and awareness programs on issues related to gender discrimination, women's rights and empowerment are key functions of the Cell. WDC conducted a Webinar on 'Understanding Gender and Sexuality'- on the occasion of The Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia. WDC also collaborated with Sexual Harassment Law Compliance Advisory (SHLC) for a workshop on 'Understanding Safe Workplaces and Your Rights at Internships'. WDC in collaboration with KSCF and ICFDR, conducted a webinar 'Locked Down: Domestic Violence/Battery in the Wake of a Pandemic'. 15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Hindu College has always focused on providing an interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary education to its students. Under the CBCS system, students are mandated to choose a Generic Elective subject, in a discipline different from their major. Similarly, the AECC course is a mandatory course for all students, as part of which they study one language in one semester and Environmental Studies in another semester. Under the newly implemented NEP, this multidisciplinary approach is encouraged even more, since students get more choice in the subjects to study. A student majoring in a particular discipline, can choose a Generic Elective (GE), a Value-Added Course (VAC), a Skill- Enhancement Course (SEC), and an Ability Enhancement Course (AEC) in any discipline of their choice. This ensures that students receive a multidisciplinary education, which would prepare them for the global job-market, and enhance their interest in multidisciplinary research and entrepreneurship. In the Academic year 2020-21, each department of the College offered at least one Generic Elective (GE) course to all students, various departments offered the AECC course to all students of the college, and all departments offered an SEC course to their own students. As part of the curriculum, various departments offer courses that encourage students to engage with the methodology and pedagogy of other disciplines. The College also offered various Short-term courses where multiple departments collaborated, for example, the Departments of Sociology and Philosophy offered a course on "Intercultural Competencies". In fulfilment of its focus on a multidisciplinary approach outside of academics as well, Hindu College recently inaugurated a unique and innovative Research Centre on its premises. Called the Relaxo Research Centre for Interdisciplinary Studies, the Centre includes various well-equipped labs and a multimedia studio with a unique focus on providing space for interdisciplinary research in sciences as well as social sciences.

17.Skill development:

Hindu College offers its students a variety of Skill Development Courses, both as part of the curriculum as well as outside the curriculum. As part of the curriculum, each department offers a variety of Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) to its students. These courses are designed to supplement the curriculum of the Core papers, as well as teach students a variety of skills that will help them put the theoretical knowledge learned as part of their syllabi into praxis. Each Honours student is mandated to study at least two Skill-Enhancement Courses in their second year of undergraduate studies, and each Programme student is mandated to study at least four in their second and third years of undergraduate studies. Other than this, the College also conducts regular skill development seminars and workshops for both students and faculty. Students also get a chance to develop their skills outside of the curriculum in the form of various short-term courses that are offered by the College. Some examples of these courses include "Intercultural Competencies" by the departments of Philosophy and Sociology, "Analytical Toxicology" by the Department of Chemistry, "Business Analytics" by the Department of Statistics, "Integrated Pest Management" by the Department of Zoology, "Programming in Python" by the Department of Physics, "Public Policy and the Global South" by the Department of Political Science, "Behavioral Economics" by the Department of Economics, and "Legal Awareness, Gender and Media" by the Department of Sociology. These are just some of many popular and successful add-on courses offered by the College that see good enrollment numbers every year because of the skill development opportunities they present. Hindu College strives to ensure that its students graduate with not only sound theoretical knowledge of their subject, but also with all the skills necessary to make them productive members of the workforce.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Hindu College ensures that the education its students receive is not distanced from their cultural and social values. As part of the curriculum, many departments offer papers that enhance their students' knowledge of Indian society and culture. For example, the Departments of History, Sociology, English, Political Science, offer specialized papers on Indian history, Indian sociological thought,

Indian literatures, and Indian political theory. The Department of Philosophy offers many Core and Elective papers on Indian Philosophy, Vedantic thought, and Yoga. The Departments of Sanskrit and Hindi also focus heavily on Indian literary cultures and thought. Outside of the curriculum too, the College ensures that students are provided avenues to learn more about Indian Knowledge systems through frequently held seminars, talks, and workshops. The College regularly hosts speakers and experts knowledgeable in Indian cultural and social thought. Hindu College also offers popular short-term courses, some of which are offered in a hybrid (both offline and online) mode, which focus on Indian Knowledge Systems. Most recently, the College offered a well-attended and successful course on "Ancient Indian Wisdom: Vedic Mathematics", in a collaborative effort on part of the Departments of Sanskrit and Mathematics. The Course helped students learn about the ancient Indian Knowledge system of Vedic Mathematics, and provided a lot of insights into a field of which not many people have sound knowledge. Other short-term courses offered by the College also focus on Indian Knowledge Systems, such as the course called "Intercultural Competencies, Indigenous Sports and North-East India" offered by the Departments of Sociology and Philosophy in a hybrid mode, which was a useful course to enhance students' knowledge about a marginalized field of study. Most of these courses are offered in both offline and online mode in order to be more accessible to those who cannot attend them in person.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

For the past few years, Hindu College, like other colleges of the University of Delhi, has been offering a curriculum that has been designed to focus on outcomes. Called 'Learning Outcome Based Curriculum Framework' (LOCF), this curriculum focuses on providing students the best theoretical knowledge as well as skills required for their life after college. As part of this curriculum, each paper offered by every department is presented in an outcome-based structure, with well-defined learning outcomes, which also become the focus of in-class pedagogy. This ensures that each paper gives necessary practical skills to the students and does not confine them to their textbooks. This curricular system also includes well-defined papers such as Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC), and Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) that provide students skills to supplement what they learn from the core papers. This focus on outcome-based education is enhanced by the newly implemented Undergraduate Curriculum Framework (UGCF) as part of the NEP. This course keeps the tradition of SEC and AECC alive, and adds other courses such as VAC (Value- Added Course) which are also structures

around well-defined learning outcomes and help students gain more supplementary knowledge. Hindu College also offers various add-on short-term courses that can be categorized as part of outcome-based education. These courses are offered in both offline and online modes, and are aimed at providing students with the kind of skills and knowledge necessary to make them successful candidates for the job-market and productive members of society. Some examples of these courses include "Intercultural Competencies" by the departments of Philosophy and Sociology, "Analytical Toxicology" by the Department of Chemistry, "Business Analytics" by the Department of Statistics, "Integrated Pest Management" by the Department of Zoology, and "Programming in Python" by the Department of Physics.

20.Distance education/online education:

Most academic and extra-curricular activities in the academic year 2020-21 had to be held via the online mode, given the COVID pandemic. But the College adapted excellently to the online mode, and ensured that all curricular and extra-curricular activities continue as always. Students and faculty rallied to the online mode, as classes successfully transitioned online, and each department of the College enthusiastically organized seminars, talks, and other activities in the online mode. The online mode made it possible for the College to invite distinguished and foreign speakers who otherwise would have found it impossible to come to the College in-person. The College also offered a variety of add-on courses in the online mode. These short-term courses were designed to enhance necessary skills for students who wished to receive education that went beyond the curriculum. Some examples of these courses include "Intercultural Competencies" by the departments of Philosophy and Sociology, "Analytical Toxicology" by the Department of Chemistry, "Business Analytics" by the Department of Statistics, "Integrated Pest Management" by the Department of Zoology, "Programming in Python" by the Department of Physics, "Public Policy and the Global South" by the Department of Political Science, "Behavioral Economics" by the Department of Economics, and "Legal Awareness, Gender and Media" by the Department of Sociology. After the pandemic, and once in-person classes started, the College continues in its mission to provide more accessible knowledge by continuing to provide these short-term courses in a hybrid mode, offline for those who can manage to come to the campus in person, and online for those who cannot. As part of the NEP too, the College continues to offer courses in the hybrid mode, and is planning to sustain the online/distance education model, given its usefulness and accessibility.

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Hindu College strictly follows the curriculum, academic plan and guidelines designed by the University of Delhi. Syllabi for all the courses and academic calendar for every academic session is designed by the University of Delhi and these documents are made available on the Delhi University website. At the beginning of each academic session, time plan for all courses vis-a-vis theory and practical sessions including generic elective and ability enhancement courses is charted out by the central time table committee and the academic plan for each department is put in place by the respective Teacher-in-charges with complete details of work load and papers taught. Teaching-learning in the classrooms is mediated through the prescribed academic calendar to ensure timely completion of course and assessment. The College follows the academic calendar prescribed by University of Delhi at the beginning of each academic session. Semester wise time plan for course delivery, preparatory time and conduct of practical and theory assessment is followed as mentioned in the calendar. The College ensures strict adherence to the academic calendar by taking the following measures:

- Central time table committee in coordination with departmental committees charts out the time plan for all courses including AECC and Generic elective papers.
- Workload for each department is calculated and submitted by respective Teacher-in-charges.
- Comprehensive academic plan and Teacher specific time tables including theory/tutorials and practicals are prepared by departmental time table committees.
- The Principal conducts meetings with College Parliament and co-curricular societies to chalk out time plan and code of conduct for extra-curricular activities in tandem with the academic calendar.
- Sessional meetings of Principal, Teacher-in-charges and IQAC are held to review and discuss curriculum delivery and continuous evaluation.
- Regular intra-departmental meetings are held to review teaching plan, continuous evaluation and conduct of academic seminars.
- Paper wise Continuous Internal Evaluation is conducted through assignments, unit tests and presentations in time frame duly decided by respective departments.
- The College has put in place an in-house developed internal assessment and attendance portal for regularly uploading student assessment and attendance records

Hindu College has a review mechanism that integrates the reviews of feedback from various stakeholders regarding infrastructure and teaching and learning, and learning outcomes. The department wise feedback on teaching-learning process is analysed. Based on feedback, smart teaching, online class access, personal assistance, academic counselling, and special trainings like remedial classes, etc. are given to students in order to improve learning outcomes. These reviews open avenues to better the teaching-learning process, strengthen the structures and methodologies of operations and improve learning outcomes. HC gives due importance to all the stakeholders, its faculty, the students and non-teaching staff. Through the college website, relevant policies, decisions, and data for public knowledge are announced and displayed. HCs' attentiveness to

the student as the central stakeholder in the teaching learning process is not limited to academic or occupational concerns but encompasses the whole individual. This is in line both with current pedagogical ideals as well as the College's historic commitment to developing engaged and able citizens. In addition to this formal feedback system, student feedback opportunities are ensured by the College's long-established practice of Departments maintaining open communication with students throughout the academic term. The Student Parliament also acts as a democratic voice for the student body. Teachers themselves engage in introspection and self-improvement based on feedback from students and suggestions from peers and superiors.

Students mentoring system at Hindu college is aimed at fostering a better rapport between the students and the teachers both at professional and personal level. Effective mentoring begins with the faculty and depends upon the healthy relationship between faculty and students. HC has introduced Mentor-Mentee Programme which is individualized and flexible to meet the students growth in all areas of life. In this program 10 to 15 (mentees) are assigned to a mentor (faculty) of the college, and receive help from and share their thoughts and problems with the mentor. Mentors act as foster-parents and guide in any area of life to the mentees by providing guidance, counselling, and advice especially in academics. This year the scheme of Interdisciplinary Research Projects was launched. The scheme is launched to give the undergraduate students an exposure of research that is happening across the globe. . Each project has 2-3 teachers and 10 students from different discipline. A grant of Rs 2.5 lakhs was sanctioned for the projects involving experimental sciences. The Projects involving Theoretical Sciences, Humanities Social Sciences were sanctioned a grant of Rs 1.5 Lakhs each. The college received an overwhelming response from teachers and students, running across from departments such as Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, History, and Statistics to Language departments such as Hindi and Sanskrit.

Students mentoring system at Hindu college is aimed at fostering a better rapport between the students and the teachers both at professional and personal level. Effective mentoring begins with the faculty and depends upon the healthy relationship between faculty and students. HC has introduced Mentor-Mentee Programme which is individualized and flexible to meet the students growth in all areas of life. In this program 10 to 15 (mentees) are assigned to a mentor (faculty) of the college, and receive help from and share their thoughts and problems with the mentor. Mentors act as foster-parents and guide in any area of life to the mentees by providing guidance, counselling, and advice especially in academics. This year the scheme of Interdisciplinary Research Projects was launched. The scheme is launched to give the undergraduate students an exposure of research that is happening across the globe. . Each project has 2-3 teachers and 10 students from different discipline. A grant of Rs 2.5 lakhs was sanctioned for the projects involving experimental sciences. The Projects involving Theoretical Sciences, Humanities Social Sciences were sanctioned a grant of Rs 1.5 Lakhs each. The college received an overwhelming response from teachers and students, running across from departments such as Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, History, and Statistics to Language departments such as Hindi and Sanskrit.

- The financial resources of the College are managed as per the statues, ordinances and rules of the University, as well as the General Finance Rules of the Government of India.
