The College also shared access to e-library resources with its faculty members and provided students access to online study material on its college portal.</p>
<p>Improving physical and mental well-being of people associated with the College.</p>	<p>During the Covid-19 pandemic, the College made all necessary efforts to protect and improve the physical and mental health of its stakeholders. It organized covid-19 awareness campaigns with the help of its student bodies like NSS and NCC. It also inducted a certified mental health counselor to help students and staff efficiently handle the stress of the pandemic. The College organized several webinars and online events to promote healthy living such as National Nutrition Week between 01.09.2020 to 05.09.2020, Fit India Movement on 25.09.2020, Pledge to Fight against Covid on 08.10.2020, Where Does Our Food Come From on 06.08.2020 and World Mental Health Day on 10.10.2020. The College counselor held several rounds of online interactions with students and staff to help alleviate their mental anxiety.</p>

<p>Infrastructure Development</p>	<p>The College has developed a New academic block covering app. 58000sq ft. which includes science labs, lecture theatres, and seminar rooms. It has also unveiled its new the-art auditorium. The College is taking a big leap towards enhancing the learning experience of students with a dedicated research facility for its faculty and students in the form of a research center that will come up shortly. The four-story building covers 38000 sq. feet. and the area will house laboratories for sciences, social sciences, linguistics, and a media laboratory.</p>
<p>Following environment friendly and sustainable practices</p>	<p>Hindu College is fully committed to protecting the environment and finding ways to restore the ecological balance. The College is the first in the University to construct a Sewage Treatment Plant of 500,000 LD capacity which is now fully functional. The Department of Chemistry has adopted green practices by minimizing the number of chemicals required for different experiments by employing diluted solutions, using smaller burettes and pipettes, and performing experiments in groups wherever feasible. Throughout the College LED lighting is used to save energy consumption. Hostels have Solar Water Heaters. Street lighting on campus is facilitated by Solar Power. The College judiciously uses paper for its official work and for academic activities. The waste paper generated by the</p>

	<p>College is collected by an NGO which utilizes it for recycling paper. The NGO makes notepads out of recycled paper thereby saving trees and lowering the impact of paper as the third largest polluter.</p>

It recognizes that a higher education institution must shape itself in such a way that students from all over the world aspire to join it. As an HEI, it cherishes the fact that each year thousands of students join its campus from various parts of the country and from various walks of life. The NCC and the NSS units of the College are constantly involved in organizing several events and initiatives to foster the feeling of tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal socioeconomic, and other diversities amongst the students. The College has Ankur Society and Equal Opportunity Cell to help the PwD students. The college holds remedial classes for helping those students who need more than regular lectures and tutorials to accomplish their learning goals. The College has an active North-East Cell that organizes events to help raise awareness about the northeastern part of the nation.</p>
<p>Building a gender neutral and inclusive culture</p>	<p>At Hindu College gender equity and sensitization have always been upheld as a very high</p>

priority pursuit. The College has always believed in the practice of giving opportunities to women to hold positions of leadership in order to develop a gender-equitable institution. Hindu College is proud of its Women Development Cell (WDC) which is committed to nurturing the strength of female students as well as creating a sensitized environment leading to gender equality. Human resource development and awareness programs on issues related to gender discrimination, women's rights, and empowerment are key functions of the Cell. WDC conducted a Webinar on 'Understanding Gender and Sexuality'- on the occasion of The Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia, and Biphobia. WDC also collaborated with the Sexual Harassment Law Compliance Advisory (SHLC) for a workshop on 'Understanding Safe Workplaces and Your Rights at Internships'. WDC in collaboration with KSCF and ICFDR, conducted a webinar 'Locked Down: Domestic Violence/Battery in the Wake of a Pandemic'. It was held on 10th July 2020 with Mr. Ravinder Vikram Singh from ICFDR and Mrs. Nibedita Phukan from KSCF.

15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Hindu College has always focused on providing an interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary education to its students. Under the CBCS system, students are mandated to choose a Generic Elective subject, in a discipline different from their major. Similarly, the AECC course is a mandatory course for all students, as part of which they study one language in one semester and Environmental Studies in another semester. Under NEP, which will be implemented with the upcoming batch, this multidisciplinary approach will be encouraged even more since students get more choices in the subjects to study. A student majoring in a particular discipline can choose a Generic Elective (GE), a Value-Added Course (VAC), a Skill-Enhancement Course (SEC), and an Ability Enhancement Course (AEC) in any discipline of their choice. This ensures that students receive a multidisciplinary education, which would prepare them for the global job market, and enhance their interest in multidisciplinary research and entrepreneurship. In the Academic the year 2021-22, each department of the College offered at least one Generic Elective (GE) course to all students, various departments offered the AECC course to all students of the college, and all departments offered an SEC course to their own students. As part of the curriculum, various departments offered courses that encourage students to engage with the methodology and pedagogy of other disciplines. The College also offered various Short-term courses where multiple departments collaborated, for example, the Departments of Sociology and Philosophy offered a course on "Intercultural Competencies".

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

This shall be applicable as per implementation of the New Education Policy. While the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is a newly-implemented practice under the New Education Policy (NEP), which the College has fully embraced in the form of multidisciplinary classes for Cluster students, the initiation of the credit system, and the implementation of the UGCF curriculum, as prescribed the University

of Delhi, Hindu College already had a set of practices in place which anticipated and facilitated the Academic Bank of Credits. The college has invested resources in development of custom designed software packages for Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP). For years, Hindu College has had a fully functional portal, Hindu Connect, which is a useful resource for recording the attendance and internal assessment data of students. This portal allows ease of access to students and faculty and also ensures smooth communication of data between the College and the University. During the pandemic time, to ensure smooth conduct of classes, the College had purchased MS Teams software and personal login ID of teachers and students were created through which classes/tests/assessments were done. Also it has licensed softwares for PwD students for making the learning process easier. The College offers a variety of interdisciplinary courses both as part of the curriculum, and outside of the curriculum as well, which students have the choice to participate in. The College has MoUs with many national and foreign institutions which allow for an exchange of skills and expertise among institutions. The College has also adapted to a blended mode of learning, and encouraged its faculty to create online and hybrid educational resources to benefit students.

17.Skill development:

Hindu College offers its students a variety of Skill Development Courses, both as part of the curriculum as well as outside the curriculum. As part of the curriculum, each department offers a variety of Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) to its students. These courses are designed to supplement the curriculum of the Core papers, as well as teach students a variety of skills that will help them put the theoretical knowledge learned as part of their syllabi into praxis. Each Honours student is mandated to study at least two Skill-Enhancement Courses in their second year of undergraduate studies and each Programme student is mandated to study at least four in their second and third years of undergraduate studies. Other than this, the College also conducts regular skill development seminars and workshops for both students and faculty. Students also get a chance to develop their skills outside of the curriculum in the form of various short-term courses that are offered by the College. Some examples of these courses include "Intercultural Competencies" by the departments of Philosophy and Sociology, "Analytical Toxicology" by the Department of Chemistry, "Business Analytics" by the Department of Statistics, "Integrated Pest Management" by the Department of Zoology, "Programming in Python" by the Department of Physics, "Public Policy and the Global South" by the Department of Political Science, "Behavioral Economics" by the

Department of Economics, and "Legal Awareness, Gender and Media" by the Department of Sociology. These are just some of many popular and successful add-on courses offered by the College that see good enrollment numbers every year because of the skill development opportunities they present. Hindu College strives to ensure that its students graduate with not only sound theoretical knowledge of their subject, but also with all the skills necessary to make them productive members of the workforce.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Hindu College ensures that the education its students receive is not distanced from their cultural and social values. As part of the curriculum, many departments offer papers that enhance their students' knowledge of Indian society and culture. For example, the Departments of History, Sociology, English, and Political Science, offer specialized papers on Indian history, Indian sociological thought, Indian literature, and Indian political theory. The Department of Philosophy offers many Core and Elective papers on Indian Philosophy, Vedantic thought, and Yoga. The Departments of Sanskrit and Hindi also focus heavily on Indian literary cultures and thought. Outside of the curriculum too, the College ensures that students are provided avenues to learn more about Indian Knowledge systems through frequently held seminars, talks, and workshops. The college regularly hosts speakers and experts knowledgeable in Indian cultural and social thought. Hindu College also offers popular short-term courses, some of which are offered in a hybrid (both offline and online) mode, which focuses on Indian Knowledge Systems. Most recently, the College offered a well-attended and successful course on "Ancient Indian Wisdom: Vedic Mathematics", in a collaborative effort on the part of the Departments of Sanskrit and Mathematics. The course helped students learn about the ancient Indian Knowledge system of Vedic Mathematics, and provided a lot of insights into a field of which not many people have sound knowledge. Other short-term courses offered by the College also focus on Indian Knowledge Systems, such as the course called "Intercultural Competencies, Indigenous Sports and North-East India" offered by the Departments of Sociology and Philosophy in a hybrid mode, which was a useful course to enhance knowledge about a marginalized field of study. Most of these courses are offered in both offline and online mode in order to be more accessible to those who cannot attend them in person.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

For the past few years, Hindu College, like other colleges of the

The University of Delhi has been offering a curriculum that has been designed to focus on outcomes. Called 'Learning Outcome Based Curriculum Framework' (LOCF), this curriculum focuses on providing students the best theoretical knowledge as well as skills required for their life after college. As part of this curriculum, each paper offered by every department is presented in an outcome-based structure, with well-defined learning outcomes, which also becomes the focus of in-class pedagogy. This ensures that each paper gives necessary practical skills to the students and does not confine them to their textbooks. This curricular system also includes well-defined papers such as Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC), and Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) that provide students skills to supplement what they learn from the core papers. This focus on outcome-based education will be enhanced by the to be implemented NEP. NEP keeps the tradition of SEC and AECC alive and adds other courses such as VAC (Value-Added Course) which are also structured around well-defined learning outcomes and help students gain more supplementary knowledge. Hindu College also offers various add-on short-term courses that can be categorized as part of outcome-based education. These courses are offered in both offline and online modes, and are aimed at providing students with the kind of skills and knowledge necessary to make them successful candidates for the job market and productive members of society. Some examples of these courses include "Intercultural Competencies" by the departments of Philosophy and Sociology, "Analytical Toxicology" by the Department of Chemistry, "Business Analytics" by the Department of Statistics, "Integrated Pest Management" by the Department of Zoology, and "Programming in Python" by the Department of Physics.

20.Distance education/online education:

Most of the academic and extra-curricular activities in the academic year 2021-22 have been held in online mode, given the COVID pandemic. But the College adapted excellently to the online mode, and ensured that all curricular and extracurricular activities continue as always. Students and faculty rallied to the online mode, as classes successfully transitioned online, and each department of the College enthusiastically organized seminars, talks, and other activities in the online mode. The online mode made it possible for the College to invite distinguished and foreign speakers who otherwise would have found it impossible to come to the College in person. The College also offered a variety of add-on courses in the online mode. These short-term courses were designed to enhance necessary skills for students who wished to receive an education that went beyond the curriculum. Some examples of these courses include "Intercultural Competencies" by the Departments of

Philosophy and Sociology, "Analytical Toxicology" by the Department of Chemistry, "Business Analytics" by the Department of Statistics, "Integrated Pest Management" by the Department of Zoology, "Programming in Python" by the Department of Physics, "Public Policy and the Global South" by the Department of Political Science, "Behavioral Economics" by the Department of Economics, and "Legal Awareness, Gender and Media" by the Department of Sociology. After the pandemic and once in-person classes started, the College continues in its mission to provide more accessible knowledge by continuing to provide these short-term courses in a hybrid mode, offline for those who can manage to come to the campus in person, and online for those who could not. As part of the NEP too, the College continued to offer courses in the hybrid mode, and is planning to sustain the online/ distance education model, given its usefulness and accessibility.

Regulations 2018, following which meetings are held at the department level to draft semester timetables. After due discussion among teachers, papers are assigned to respective teachers

- On the website, timetables can be accessed teacher wise, class wise and room number wise. Timetables are also put up outside the classrooms for convenience of the students. The ratio of lectures and tutorial as mandated by UGC is followed in the timetables.
- Tutorials are held regularly, so that teachers can address student's queries regarding the syllabus. Remedial classes are also held for better learning and timely implementation of the syllabus.
- During the COVID pandemic, the college switched to online mode of classes using Microsoft Teams LMS platform and each student and faculty was provided with unique login credentials for establishing virtual classrooms.
- For classroom teaching, traditional chalk-and-board method as well as ICT based methods of flipped classroom and blended learning are integrated.
- The College has also devised a mentor-mentee system for addressing the problems faced by students in a better manner.

The college follows the University's curriculum. Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values, and Professional Ethics are included in the University's curriculum. Further, the college has an Annual Gender Sensitization Action Plan for each year under which a

number of curricular and co-curricular activities are organised. There is a stringent Code of Conduct and Code of ethics, as well as a Green policy, which are strictly implemented.

The College conducts women-focused gender equality programmes annually as well as for the transgender community, covering a range of issues such as empowerment, self-defence, mental health, laws for women, health checkups, etc. There is a girls' hostel and a girls' common room for day scholars. All Government Flagship programmes, e.g., Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav, Swatch Bharath Abhiyan, International Women's Day, Blood Donation Camps, and more, are part of the College's Academic Calendar. NSS also actively works to raise social and environmental awareness. It organises Health check camps, tree plantations, community cleanliness, water conservation, blood donation, and a plastic-free campaign as priorities.

Personality development, self-defence training, yoga, and counselling are available. Gender Sensitivity programmes are conducted for students, faculty, and staff.

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Students mentoring system at Hindu college is aimed at fostering a better rapport between the students and the teachers both at professional and personal level. Effective mentoring begins with the faculty and depends upon the healthy relationship between faculty and students. HC has introduced Mentor-Mentee Programme which is individualized and flexible to meet the students growth in all areas of life. In this program 10 to 15 (mentees) are assigned to a mentor (faculty) of the college, and receive help from and share their thoughts and problems with the mentor. Mentors act as foster-parents and guide in any area of life to the mentees by providing guidance, counselling, and advice especially in academics. This year the scheme of Interdisciplinary Research Projects was launched to give the undergraduate students an exposure of research that is happening across the globe. Each project has 2-3 teachers and 10 students from different discipline. A grant of Rs 2.5 lakhs was sanctioned for the

projects involving experimental sciences. The Projects involving Theoretical Sciences, Humanities Social Sciences were sanctioned a grant of Rs 1.5 Lakhs each. The college received an overwhelming response from teachers and students, running across from departments such as Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, History, and Statistics to Language departments such as Hindi and Sanskrit.

Recently, the cell came up with an innovative UV-C disinfection machine and won recognition by the MoE, under the NISP initiative.
- The IQAC of Hindu College has also taken keen initiatives towards enhancing knowledge in this area and has been regularly organizing a number of Research and IPR lectures and seminars.
- As part of the curriculum, many departments offer papers that enhance their students' knowledge of Indian society and culture. The Department of Philosophy offers many Core and Elective papers on Indian Philosophy, Vedantic thought, and Yoga. - Additionally, a dedicated Centre for Interdisciplinary Research will be inaugurated soon, it aims at imparting skills beyond the curriculum, housing 22 well-equipped labs.
- 1435 computers (1190 laptops and 245 desktops) are available for students and faculty.
- The college has an ultra-modern auditorium, "Sanganeria Auditorium", 3362 sq. ft. in area, and a capacity of 900 individuals. Another auditorium "Sushila Devi Auditorium" with a capacity of 250, will be available in the research center.
- The college has two Science Museums - one botany and another zoology having more than 200 specimens for various species of animals and plants.
- The college has an air-conditioned Seminar Room with a dedicated desktop, LCD projector, 70 table-top mikes, and a powerful sound system.
- The Hindu College Library, one of the oldest among Delhi University college libraries, is fully air-conditioned and computerized and provides easy access to digital knowledge

resources through DULS. There is a well-equipped Reading Room, which subscribes to a large number of dailies, weeklies, periodicals, and journals on a variety of subjects.

- The college has a Digital Resource cluster of around 220 computers that have wifi connectivity.

- The management of college affairs is thoroughly decentralized and the participation of different stakeholders is ensured. In the everyday functioning of the college, this is reflected in the various committees that are constituted with well-defined roles and principles.

- Some of the major infrastructural developments which are commensurate with institutional perspective plan are enumerated below:
- On 8th October 2021, Hindu College held an inauguration ceremony for this new state-of-the-art Sanganeria Auditorium, with centralized air conditioning, acoustics enhancement, stage renovation and green room revamp, giving a complete overhaul to the auditorium.
- A dedicated research facility Relaxo Research Centre for Interdisciplinary Research, for sciences and social sciences, with a linguistics lab, media lab, and various science labs has been constructed.

- In meeting with the Environment regulations, our college has been the first in the University to have constructed a Sewage Treatment Plant of 500,000 LD capacity which is now fully functional.
- Just beside the research centre, an open and green amphitheater has also been constructed, as a student friendly space for their cultural activities.

- The institution has a mechanism to ensure adequate budgetary provisions for academic and administrative activities and to monitor the effective and efficient use of financial resources.
- While the financial management is governed by the statutes, rules and ordinances of the University and the General Financial Rules of the Government of India, the Governing Body of the College looks after the utilization of the available resources and funds. All incomes and expenditures have to be approved by the Treasurer of the Governing Body.
